The idea of ValiDE

Democracy education and the civil society need close linkage to create active and reflective democratic citizens. Addressing the need to strengthen democracy education in primary schools on the level of initial teacher education we obtain outcomes on several dimensions.

Exchange promotes common values

Aiming at competencies and beliefs for democratic values in initial teacher education, universities and non-governmental organizations from three countries are joining forces. This collaboration intends to link these organizations in their different views and thus produce mutual enrichment.

Long lasting trans-national partnership

- Ongoing partnership between the universities on staff as well as student level and the organisations of civic engagement.
- Schools making use of the organisations' educational programs.

Checklist for the journey

To be well prepared, take a look at this personal checklist ranging from luggage options to the local weather forecast. Travelling during the COVID-19 pandemic requires more preparation than you are probably used to.

1. Check travel documents

You will travel in three different countries with different travel requirements. Which travel documents you need depends on a couple of factors:

- your country of departure, transfer, and destination
- your nationality
- your country of residence

First check the document type you need to travel and whether you need a passport or visa, or other travel documents.

Read all about testing, vaccination, health declarations, and entry requirements. A COVID-19 document check is also needed.

2. Check your medical insurance for insurance cover abroad over this period

We also recommend to carry with you a set of medicines you might need during your travels. Especially in Norway prices for prescription-free medication are significantly higher than in other European countries.

3. Check travel guidelines

You will travel by bus, train and flight. Read all about the (hygiene) measures, face masks, and what you can expect on board. You will get further information to the maximum size and weight of your luggage. For the flight, remember the maximum amount of liquids in your hand luggage and the 1-litre plastic zip-bag, with each container carrying maximum 100ml.

4. Study equipment

You will have to take your notebook, tablet or whatever you need to work, with you. **Notebooks need to be carried in your hand/cabin luggage.** Airlines do not allow notebooks in hold (checked-in) luggage!

5. Prepare for delayed luggage

The situation at airports is very difficult at times, due to missing ground personnel distributing the checked-in luggage. Try to carry one set of clothes, toothbrush, etc. with you in your hand luggage, to be prepared for the first day in another country, even if your luggage will follow you with a one-day delay.

Documents

When traveling internationally, you must always carry a valid ID with you to cross the border. Without a valid ID FlixBus refuses the entry.

Travel by train

- be at the train station 15 minutes earlier
- take a valid identification card or passport with you

Luggage

There are no specific conditions for the luggage when you are travelling by train. You can take laptops, backpacks, suitcases and any kind of bags with you for free. No measurements are needed.

Attention: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic wearing a face and nose mask in public transportations in Germany is still obligatory!

Travel by plane

- be at the airport at least two hours earlier
- take a valid identification card or passport with you
- be sure the luggage matches the conditions of the flight

Flights Krakow - Kristiansand and Kristiansand - Krakow are with Norwegian Airlines. The flight Kristiansand - Stuttgart is with KLM.

Checked baggage allowances

- Each bag must not exceed 250 x 79 x 112 cm (L x H x W), with a maximum weight of 23 kg.

Your hand baggage can have a combined weight of up to 10 kg.

- 1 item of hand baggage with a maximum size of 55 x 23 x 40 cm;
- 1 accessory (such as a small handbag or laptop bag) with a maximum size of 30 x 20 x 38 cm.

KLM Royal Dutch Airlines (<https://www.klm.de/en/information/baggage/>):

Checked baggage allowances

- 1 item of checked baggage, up to 158 cm (length + width + height) including handles and wheels and with a maximum weight of 23 kg.

Your hand baggage can have a combined weight of up to 12 kg.

- 1 item of hand baggage with a maximum size of 55 x 35 x 25 cm including handles and wheels;
- 1 accessory (such as a small handbag or laptop bag) with a maximum size of 40 x 30 x 15 cm.

As there are often problems with the luggage, pack the most important washing utensils, toothbrush and a change of underwear and socks in your hand luggage.

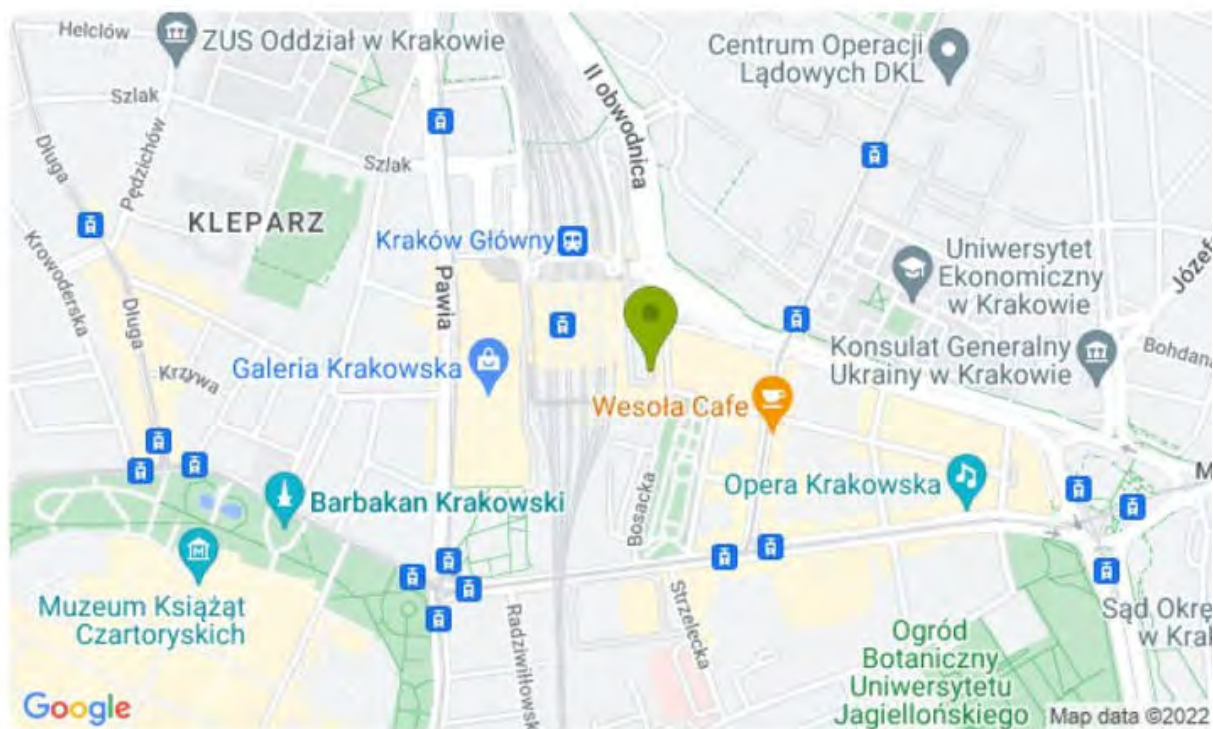

Arrival in Ravensburg by public transport

From the main train station you can reach the youth hostel on foot within 25 minutes via Eisenbahnstraße - Marienplatz - Marktstraße - Obertor - stairway or the new barrier-free switchback to the Veitsburg.

A taxi from the main train station will cost you approx. 7 Euro.

From the airport in Kristiansand a maxi taxi will bring you to your hotel. There you are going to meet a person from the University i Agder, who will welcome you.

Information to your stay in Ravensburg and Tübingen (Germany)

Meals:

In the Youth hostel Veitsburg in Ravensburg breakfast is included. Other meals like lunch or dinner need be organized by your own.

During your stay in Tübingen there is no breakfast in the hotel but you have two rooms with a kitchen.

Other:

In Ravensburg you have to take towels by yourself. Bed linen will be found in the hostel.

Information to your stay in Krakow and Kielce (Poland)

Meals:

In your hostel Krakowiak in Krakow breakfast is included. But not in the morning of the 25th September.

During your stay in Kielce there is no breakfast included but there is a kitchen available. You can have lunch e.g. in the nearby Galeria Echo shopping centre.

Other: We are not sure, whether you need to take towels with you. Please take towels with you.

Information to your stay in Kristiansand (Norway)

Meals:

In your hotel there is no breakfast. But you will find a grocery store (Rema) right next to the hotel. Vending machines for drinks and snacks are available in the hotel lobby. A good breakfast or lunch can be bought at Camillo Bastrup Coffee Shop just down the street.

Climate

Germany has a moderate climate with warm summers and cold winters. German average temperature in winter is around 3°C and in summer around 18°C.

The coldest weather tends to hit around January and the warmest around July.

Local time

Germany is in the Central European (CET) time zone (GMT+1hr). German summer time (GMT+2hrs) starts on the last Sundays of March and ends on the last Sunday of October.

Electricity

Electricity in Germany is 230V, 50Hz AC. Plug sockets are round with two roundpin sockets.

Money

Germany is one of EU countries to have adopted the Euro as currency. In Germany, it is recommended to have cash available, especially for small amounts (less than €10). Credit or debit often can be used.

Internet

Internet access is typically free and widely available in Germany, with practically every café and restaurant offering wi-fi to customers with laptops and smartphones.

Global Ethic Foundation (Stiftung Weltethos)



Global Ethic in 2 minutes

The Stiftung Weltethos (Global Ethic Foundation) was founded in 1995 with the primary programmatic goals of (1) Implementing and promoting intercultural and interreligious research; (2) Stimulating and implementing intercultural and interreligious educational work; (3) Promoting and creating opportunities for interreligious and intercultural encounter, all based on the belief that there can be, in the words of its founder Prof. Dr. Hans Küng, “No peace among nations without peace among religions. No peace among religions without dialogue among religions. No dialogue among religions without global ethical standards. No survival of our globe in peace and justice without a new paradigm of international relations based on global ethical standards.” (Hans Küng on 9.11.2001 before the United Nations General Assembly on the Dialogue of Civilizations) In the pursuit of these programmatic goals, GEF remains neutral and independent in its worldview.

Through educational programs and the promotion of intercultural meeting, GEF has been active in the communication of common values and the finding of common ground between people of different backgrounds. Through decades of fundamental research by Prof. Küng, and his collaborators, and through other scholars associated with GEF, it has a profound knowledge of all the world's religions, their common values, and their significance for our globalized world. Currently 20 employees are working in Tübingen plus further freelance employees in Germany and in other countries. In Austria exists a „Weltethos Initiative“ (www.weltethos.at) and in Switzerland there is a Swiss „Weltethos-Stiftung“ (<http://www.weltethos.ch>). Both are independent of the GEF. One of the central challenges of modern European society is facilitating the peaceful coexistence of people from different cultural backgrounds and religious traditions. A basic operating premise of GEF is that laws alone are not enough: Common values are needed as a basis for successful politics and a successful life in a diverse and pluralistic society. Ultimately, it is the responsibility of people to act in accordance with these common values.

Global Ethic Schools

The *Global Ethic School* seal has been in existence since 2014. The label is awarded by the Global Ethic Foundation to schools that

- incorporate the global ethic idea into their curriculum,
- find ways to anchor it in everyday school life.

21 schools have received the seal:

- 13 schools from Baden-Württemberg, 3 from North Rhine-Westphalia, 3 from Bavaria, 1 from Saxony as well as 1 from Luxembourg.
- 3 more schools are currently in the process of approval.

Your accommodation in Germany

Weingarten is located in Southern Baden-Württemberg, surrounded by the Alps, Lake Constance, and the Swabian Alb. The city of Ravensburg lies directly adjacent. Together, these two interlocking urban centers comprise a population of around 75,000 and are home to three universities. A total of 8,000 students help shape life in Ravensburg-Weingarten.

Youth Hostel Ravensburg (Veitsburg)

Ravensburg is the cultural and economic focus of Upper Swabia. Its historic roots as a service and commercial center go back to the Middle Ages. This is proved by the mediaeval city centre with gothic patrician houses, sacred buildings, gates, towers and the remains of the city wall. High above the city there is Veitsburg castle, the ancestral seat of Guelfic dukes, which later was entered into possession of the Hohenstaufen dynasty. With them Ravensburg evolved to the most important city between the Danube and Lake Constance and became imperial city.

The Youth Hostel in the "Veitsburg" castle is situated on a hill over the city Ravensburg. It is about 500 meters away from the city centre. From the main train station you can reach the youth hostel on foot within 25 minutes via Eisenbahnstraße - Marienplatz - Marktstraße - Obertor - stairway or the **new barrier-free switchback** to the Veitsburg.

All rooms are equipped with sinks and toilets. There is also WLAN in the public room.

Konzept Hotel Neue Horizonte

This hotel is situated 500 meters away from the art hall of Tübingen (Kunsthalle Tübingen), 1,9 km from the University of Tübingen, 2,3 km from the market place (Marktplatz), 2,2 km from the narrow streets of the Jews (Judengasse) and 3,7 km from the French Quartier (Französisches Viertel).

The hotel offers an express-check-in and check-out as well as free WLAN in all areas and it is allergic friendly.

How I can get from A to B? - Guideline

1) From the Ravensburg Youth Hostel to the University of Education Weingarten

Information: In the morning of 12th. September the students of the University of Education will pick you up at the Youth hostel to show you the way to the university.

Description Veitsburg to Weingarten

From Veitsburg Hostel walk 180 meters, then turn left to "Philosophenweg". Take the stairs and turn right towards "Philosophenweg". After 8 meters turn left to "Marktstraße". Go 61 meters ahead to "Humpisstraße". Then turn right to "Gänsbühl". After 56 meters turn left to "Herrenstraße". After 67 meters turn right to "Frauenstraße". Follow this street for 30 meters and you will get to the bus stop "Wilhelmsstraße". The bus you have to take is called "Stadtbus RV/WGT 1". Outside of the bus is written "Baint, Marsweiler".

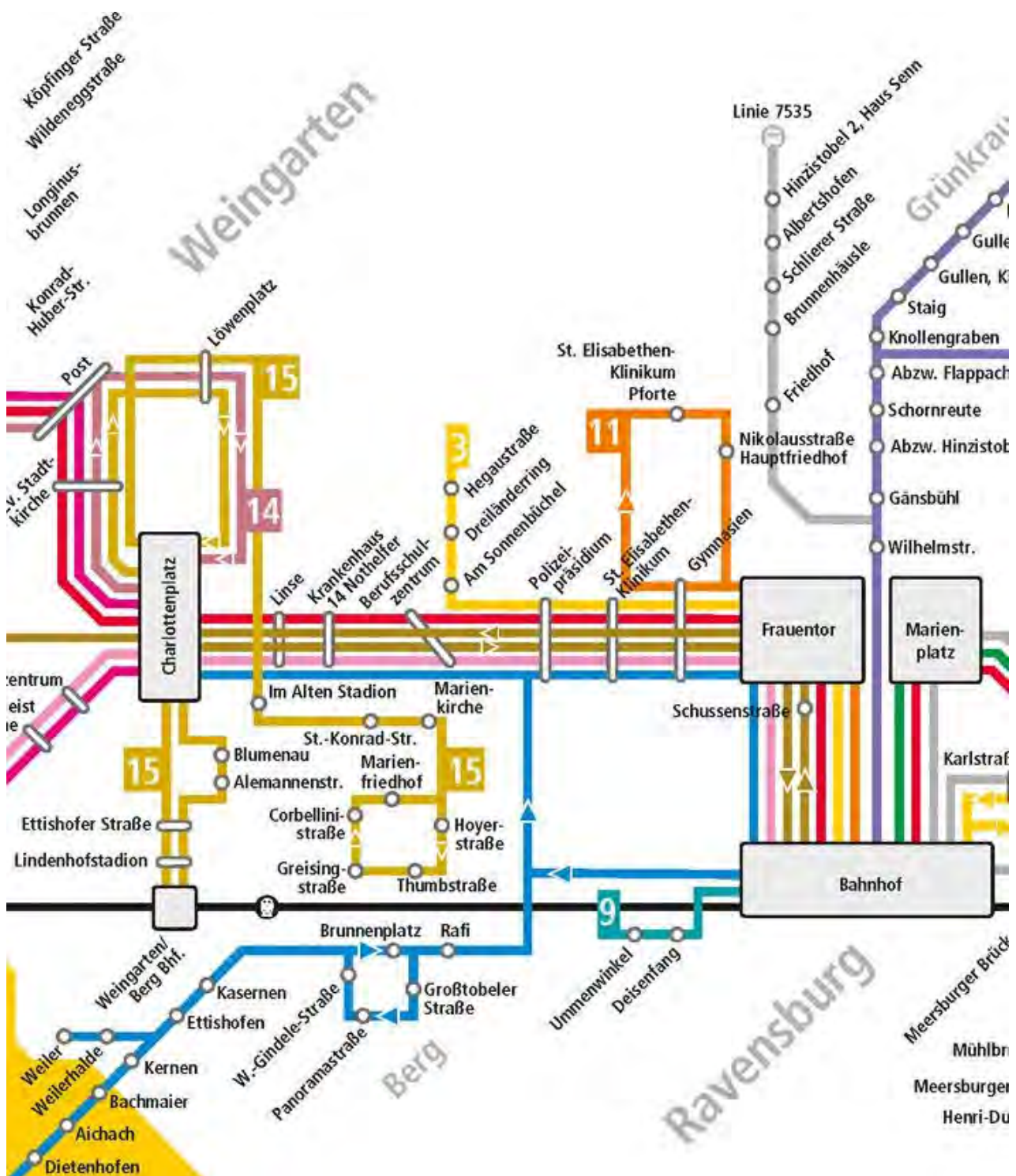

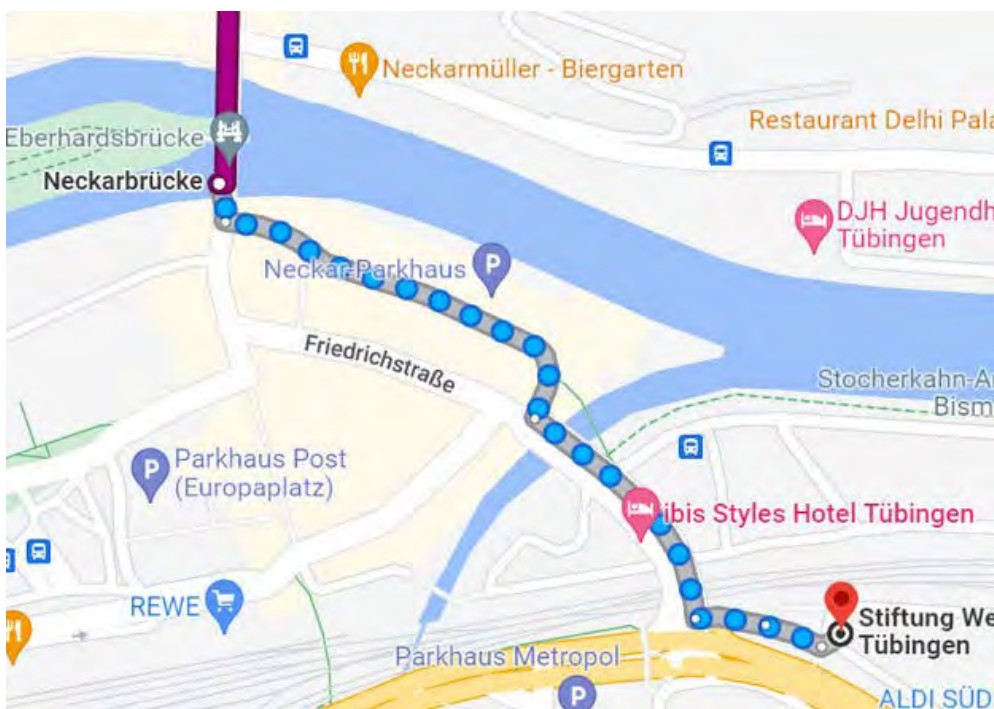


2) From the Konzept Hotel Neue Horizonte to the Global Ethic Foundation Tübingen (Stiftung Weltethos)

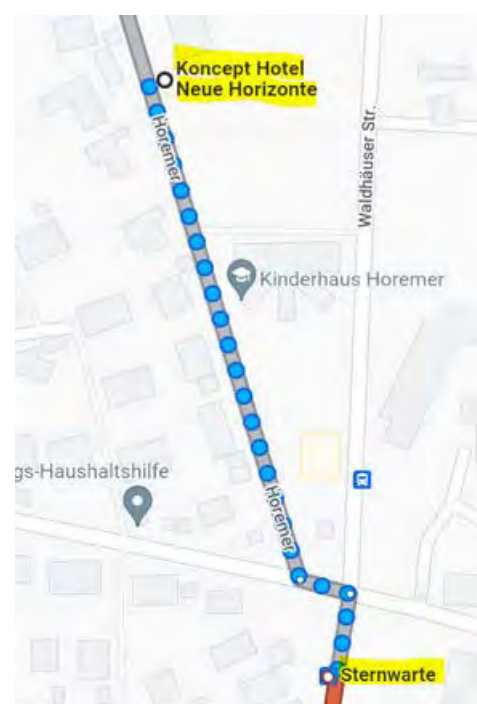

Ravensburg

Welcome to Ravensburg!

Ravensburg, "The city of towers and gates" is situated between Lake Constance and Allgaeu in a scenic landscape with a view of the Alps. In the past, the city was a major, medieval commercial centre. Today, with its 50,000 residents, it is the lively, economic hub of Upper Swabia and an attractive holiday destination.

A little bit of history...

It was once a Free Imperial City back in the days of the Holy Roman Empire and was a major trading centre in the Middle Ages.

Nowadays it is also famous in another field - with the Ravensburger games company (renowned for its jigsaw puzzles) being named after and headquartered in the town. This later led to the building of the most imposing tower in Ravensburg, the cylindrical white Mehlsack ('flour sack') so that the inhabitants could keep an eye on the goings-on on the hill.

Before that, however, Ravensburg had flourished as a trading location. Merchants imported spices, metal ores and wine from different parts of the known world from the 15th century onwards and exported cloth and paper. The "Grosse Ravensburger Handelsgesellschaft", formed from merchants in the Lake Constance area, became one of the most important commercial organisations in Europe.

Even when the riches from the trade routes started to diminish, as new ones were opened up via towns such as Augsburg, the paper production remained important through to the 19th century.

Ravensburg was not spared from the religious strife of the Reformation and Counter-Reformation but did become one of the towns in southwestern Germany with guaranteed religious equality in the 17th century.

Ravensburg lost its position as a Free Imperial Town in the Napoleonic wars at the beginning of the 19th century and became first part of Bavaria and then taken over by the Kingdom of Württemberg.

Industrialisation and the building of rail links first to Friedrichshafen and later to Ulm in the mid-19th century helped with the expansion of the town. Most of the industry was light engineering and textile production but was never bombed in the Second World War and was surrendered to the French forces with no damage to the old town.

The Towers of Ravensburg

Most of the historic towers and town wall surrounding the city centre of Ravensburg date from the 14th and 15th century.

The original town fortifications stretched only to the present-day Marienplatz but as the settlement became more prosperous and attracted more inhabitants the defensive walls were extended outwards to the structures that can be seen today.

The oldest of them is the Obertor and the tallest, at 51m in height, is the neighbouring Mehlsack (see picture below), both of them located on the southeastern edge of the old town. The Blaserturm, almost as high as the Mehlsack, stands on its own in the city centre. It used to be part of the old walls before the town expansion. The 212 steps to the lookout point can be climbed in the summer months. The Mehlsack can be climbed in August and September on the weekend.

A stroll through the old town of Ravensburg

"Marienplatz" in the centre of Ravensburg is the ideal starting point from which to explore the town: visit "Bachstraße", for example, a bustling street with a stream flowing through it, or the lovingly restored "Marktstraße". Ravensburg offers a wide choice of stores with all kinds of goods, chic boutiques and attractive shops that guarantee a pleasurable shopping experience. The town's pedestrian areas invite you to take a leisurely stroll, or combine a browse through the shops with a tour of the historic old town – either by yourself or as part of a guided tour every Wednesday and Saturday. The historic town centre can be easily reached from the eight car parks located around the town centre or from the railway and bus stations.

Weingarten

Welcome to Weingarten!

Weingarten is a town with a population of 24,000 in Württemberg, in the district of Ravensburg, in the valley of the Schussen River. Together with the southern neighbour cities of Ravensburg and Friedrichshafen on Lake Constance, it forms one of 14 medium-sized infrastructural centres in Baden-Württemberg. The town is seat of the University of Applied Sciences of Ravensburg-Weingarten and of the Pedagogical University of Weingarten.

Abby of Weingarten

Weingarten Abbey or St. Martin's Abbey (German: Reichsabtei Weingarten until 1803, then merely Abtei Weingarten) is a benedictine monastery on the Martinsberg (St. Martin's Mount) in Weingarten.

The abbey and the St. Martin's Basilica are a major attraction on the tourist route known as the Oberschwäbische Barockstrasse (Upper Swabian Baroque Route).

The current church was built between 1715 and 1724 in the Italian-German Baroque style. The church is the second largest church in Germany, and is the largest Baroque church in Germany. The 102 meter long church is known as the "Swabian St. Peter's" since this church is almost exactly one-half the size of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

Within the church is the famous Gabler Organ, a church organ that was built between 1735 and 1750 by Joseph Gabler. The organ has over 60 registers, 169 ranks, 63 voices and over 6600 pipes.

A wing of the abbey precincts accommodates the present monastery. Other parts of the former abbey house the Pädagogische Hochschule Weingarten and the Academy of the Diocese of Rottenburg-Stuttgart.

Relic of the Holy Blood of Jesus

The greatest treasure of Weingarten was its famous relic of the Precious Blood, still preserved in the church of Weingarten. Its legend runs thus: Longinus, the soldier who opened Jesus's side with a lance, caught some of the Sacred Blood and preserved it in a leaden box, which later he buried at Mantua.

Blutritt in Weingarten (Blood Ride of Weingarten)

The Blutritt in Weingarten is regarded as the biggest equestrian procession in Europe. It takes place on the Friday after Ascension Day, also known as "Blood Friday" ("Blutfreitag"). In 1529 the Blutritt was first mentioned in writing, but even then it was labeled as an old custom. The Relic of the Holy Blood is kept in the church of the Weingarten Abbey. Traditionally, the Blutritt is a pilgrimage for men.

On the day of the Blutritt, the "Rider of the Holy Blood" (German: Heilig-Blut-Reiter) carries the relic through Weingarten and the surrounding areas.

Tübingen

Welcome to Tübingen!

Tübingen is a quaint town near Stuttgart with its own Swabian traditions. Known as one of the youngest cities in Germany (thanks to the many students, the average age has been roughly 40 years), Tübingen can boast sloping, charming rows of houses in medieval style as well as a highly regarded university.

Tübingen's main landmark is most definitely the row of colourful, narrow houses sitting along the River Neckar. Part of this famous scenery is the yellow Hölderlinturm (Hölderlin's tower) where the poet Friedrich Hölderlin lived until his death in 1843. Speaking of German writers, Tübingen is known as the city of poets and thinkers. Ludwig Uhland and Hermann Hesse spent some time of their lives in Tübingen, and a sign stating "Hier kotzte Goethe" ("This is where Goethe puked") serves as popular memory of Goethe's visit to the university town.

The lovingly restored medieval town centre with its decorative facades and narrow alleys invite strollers to saunter about. The square-shaped market place is especially pretty, partly because of the town hall with a facade of paintings and its astronomical clock. Roughly 10 to 14 times a year, there is all hustle and bustle when tourists flock to town from all over the world to visit one of the many markets with little stalls spread across the historic centre. Germany's biggest chocolate festival, The ChocoART; Umbrian-Provencal market and Christmas market are just a few of the most famous ones to mention.

Castles of Tübingen and Hohentübingen

Tübingen's castle is located on one of the many hills that shape the town and are more often than not complained about. It is free to visit and offers a superb view over the town and surrounding hills. On clear days, one can even make out parts of the Swabian Alps. Schloss Hohentübingen was mentioned for the first time as a fort in 1078, nowadays, it hosts different institutes and serves as a museum about ancient cultures. Parts of the rooms are used by the university.

Eberhard-Karls University

Tübingen is primarily known as a student town. Its internationally renowned university, founded in 1477, is one of the oldest universities in Europe. Awarded with the title of "Elite University" in 2012, it offers about 30 study programmes and is especially famous for its scientific faculties. No less than eleven Nobel Laureates in Medicine, Chemistry and Physics are associated with the university.

The beautiful, historic campuses are situated right in the city centre, where the student vibe can be constantly felt. Especially popular is the old botanical garden, simply called "Bota", located next to the main campuses. During the day, the park is used for playing sports or having a picnic and on warm summer nights, cosy get-togethers and barbecues are scattered across the park.

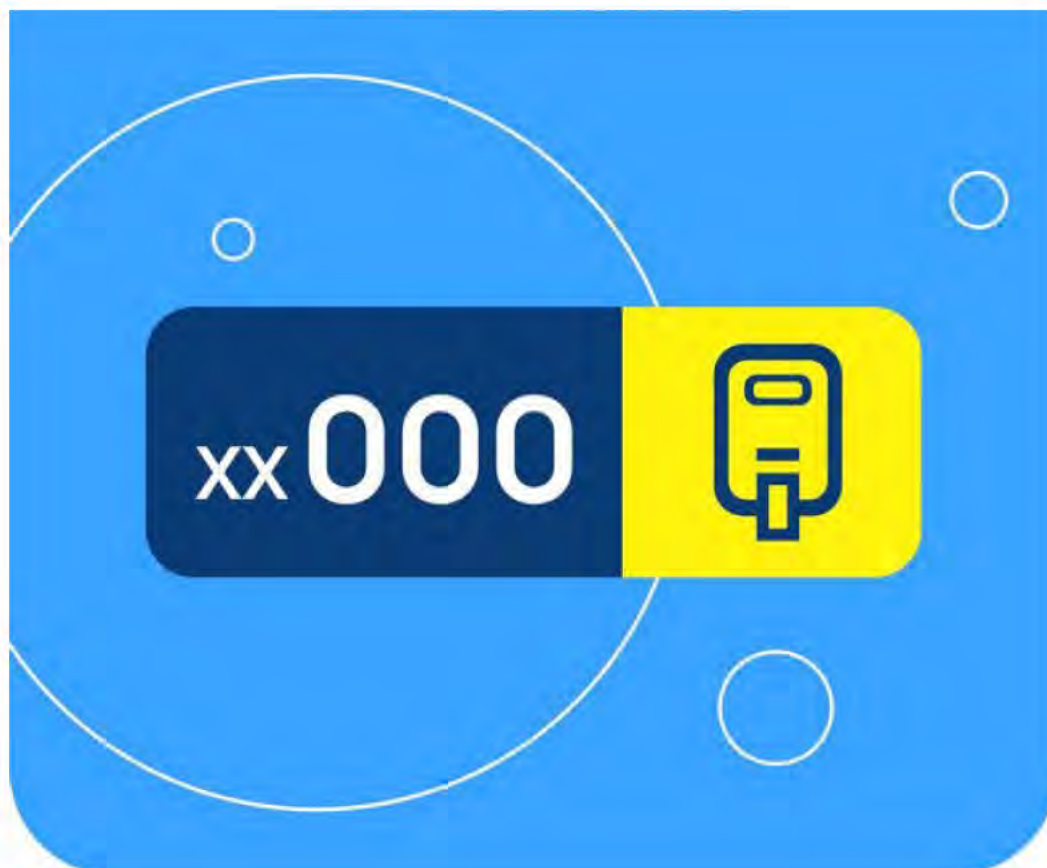
A useful application

The latest rules for buying tickets online using the app

JakDojade.pl allows you to check the timetables of buses, trains, and streetcars of specific lines. The application allows you to determine a route between two points and automatically select the best connection. You can also buy tickets there. Before buying a ticket on the app, you need to create an account and recharge your virtual wallet. According to guidelines **in Krakow**, you are required to enter **the side number of the tram or bus when you punch your ticket**.

What does the side number look like and where to find it?

The number consists of 5 characters - a combination of letters and numbers. The sticker on which you will find it is located at the ticket counter.



Airport transfer

Buses

Three daily bus lines currently operate from Krakow Airport: **208**, **209**, **300**, and a night line: **902**. These are agglomeration lines. The bus stop is located near the passenger terminal

- at the ticket machine in the passenger terminal, level 0 (arrivals hall)
- at the ticket vending machine at the MPK bus stop (payment by cash or card)
- at ticket vending machines on buses (payment by card)

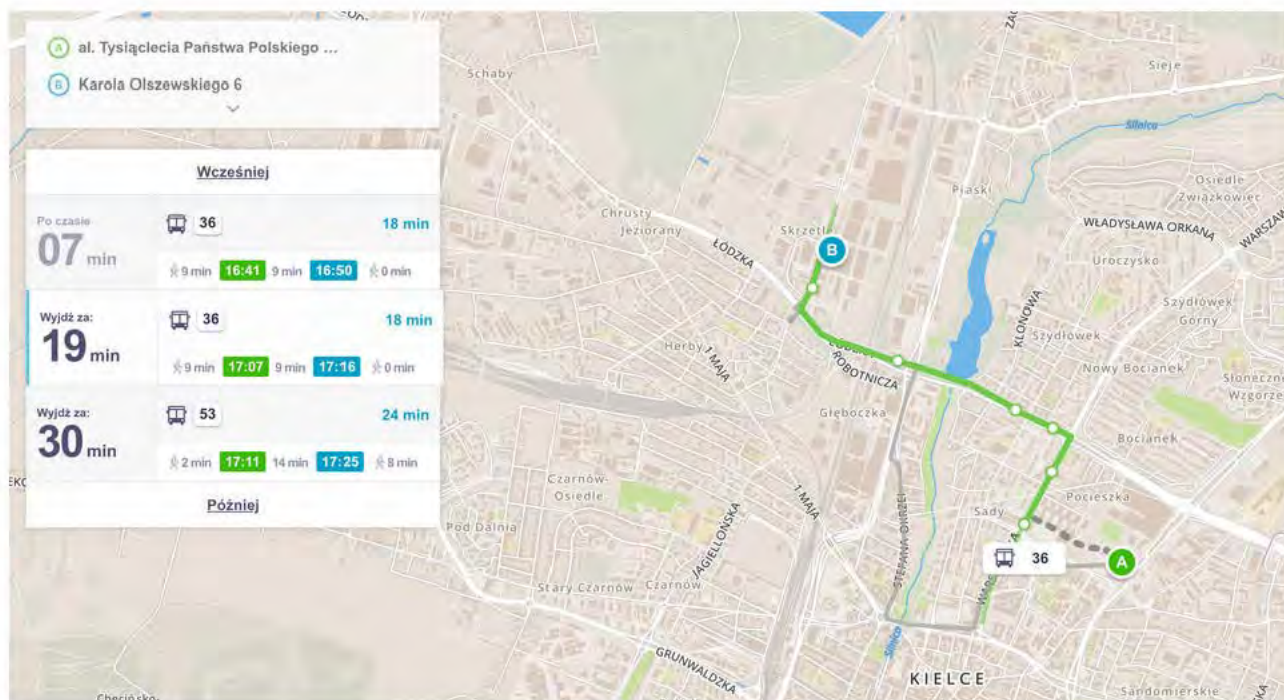

Kielce

The legendary beginnings of Kielce date back to the Middle Ages, when in the place of the present capital huge trees rustled in the Świętokrzyskie Voivodeship, and the forests were full of wilderness game.

In such a forest, Prince Mieszko, son of Bolesław the Bold, hunted with his team. One evening he separated from his companions. The lost prince was attacked by robbers, and the young heir to the throne defended the division and defeated all his attackers. One of the robbers handed the thirsty prince the bottle. Mieszko, not anticipating the trick, instead water, drank poison and choked. Then there was the light from which it emerged Saint Adalbert.

Mieszko knelt and the saint drew a winding line with his crosier. Following the trail water flowed, quenching the prince's thirst and washing the poison from his mouth. Mieszko blew a horn and the team soon appeared. Driving away from the clearing, the prince noticed huge white fangs. He promised to build a castle with a church in this place. It was founded shortly after a settlement in the heart of the forest, and a church of St. Wojciech. The stream from which the water restored the prince's strength and was called Silica, and the settlement took the name of Kielce as a souvenir fangs found

Climate

Norway has a moderate climate with warm summers and cold winters. Norwegian average temperature in winter is around 3°C and in summer around 18°C.

The coldest weather tends to hit around January and the warmest around July.

In September, morning and evenings in Southern Norway can already be quite chilly, even if the rest of the day is rather sunny and warm.

Local time

Norway is in the Central European (CET) time zone (GMT+1hr). Norwegian summer time (GMT+2hrs) starts on the last Sundays of March and ends on the last Sunday of October.

Electricity

Electricity in Norway is 230V, 50Hz AC. Plug sockets are round with two roundpin sockets.

Money

The currency in Norway is called Norwegian Krone (NOK). Exchange rates can be checked by typing into Google "[Your currency abbreviation] in NOK". Then you can easily enter an amount and see how much this would be in NOK, and vice versa.

Norwegians barely use any cash (called "kontant" in Norwegian). All debit or credit cards are usually accepted in all places. We strongly advise you NOT to change/bring any cash in NOK for your stay in Norway. You will not need it.

Internet

On UiA campus students from abroad can use eduroam by logging in with their regular information. The hotel and ARKIVET will provide wi-fi as well. Norway is part of the European area that allows you to use your mobile internet the same way you would use it in your home country. Reception is usually very good.

Travel to and arrival in Norway

Arrival at Oslo Gardermoen airport

When flying to Norway via Oslo Gardermoen airport, all passengers have to collect their checked-in luggage, pass the customs station and then check it in at the airline counters once more (and also pass the security check once more). It happens regularly that passengers forget to collect their luggage when arriving in Oslo. Hold luggage that is not picked up after landing in Oslo will not be processed further to the final destination automatically and remain at the airport!

Norwegian customs

Norway is not an EU member state, thus you will have to follow specific custom guidelines. These can be found on www.toll.no.

Specific rules apply for example to how much alcoholic drinks, tobacco, dairy products and other goods may be imported to Norway per person free of additional custom charges. If you are considering to bring any of these products with you, please consult the website www.toll.no or use their application for mobile phones.

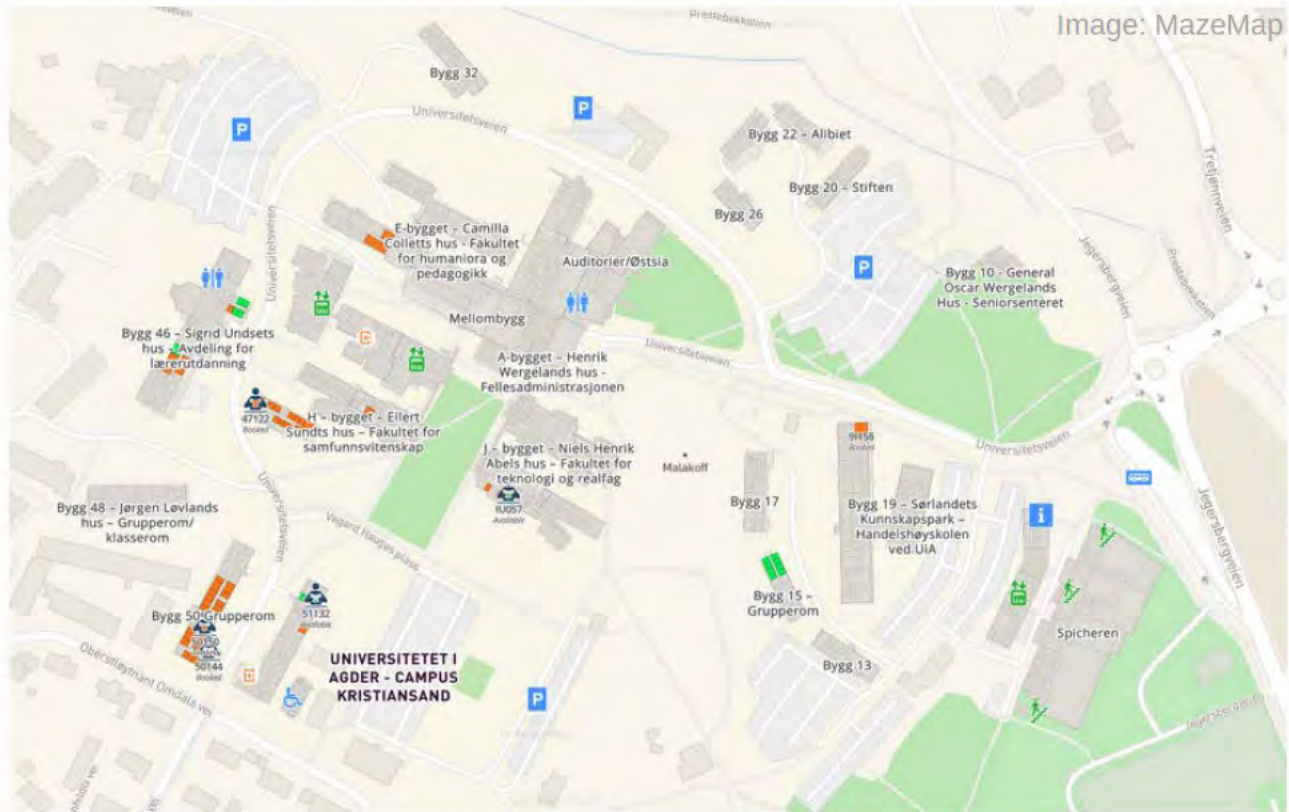

Your accommodation in Norway

Kristiansand is located in the county of Vest-Agder which, together with Aust-Agder, constitutes the Southern Norwegian region called "Sørlandet". The University of Agder consists of two campuses, one in Kristiansand, and one in Grimstad.

Kristiansand offers several recreational areas such as "Jegersberg" right behind the university campus, "Baneheia" next to the city center and very close to the Citybox Lite hotel, and a beautiful peninsula being embedded in the stunning "Skjærgården" with all its small islands.

Citybox Lite hotel

The Citybox Lite hotel is located in the city center of Kristiansand in Tordenskjolds gate 12, 4612. Each room is equipped with a bathroom, towels and bed linen. Cleaning during longer stays has to be requested at the reception, otherwise rooms will be cleaned after departure. The hotel offers free Wi-Fi.

Breakfast

Vending machines for drinks and snacks are available at the hotel, but breakfast will not be provided. We recommend buying breakfast at the supermarkets Rema1000 or ExtraParken around the corner, or at smaller bakeries or coffee shops. A lower-budget bakery that offers sweet and savory goods and also coffee and tea is for example "Bake Me Up" in Markens gate, not too far from the Citybox Lite hotel.

The university campus also offers breakfast at two cafes, and a smaller supermarket "Joker" can be found close to the bus station, next to the SiA student center.



How I can get from city center to campus?

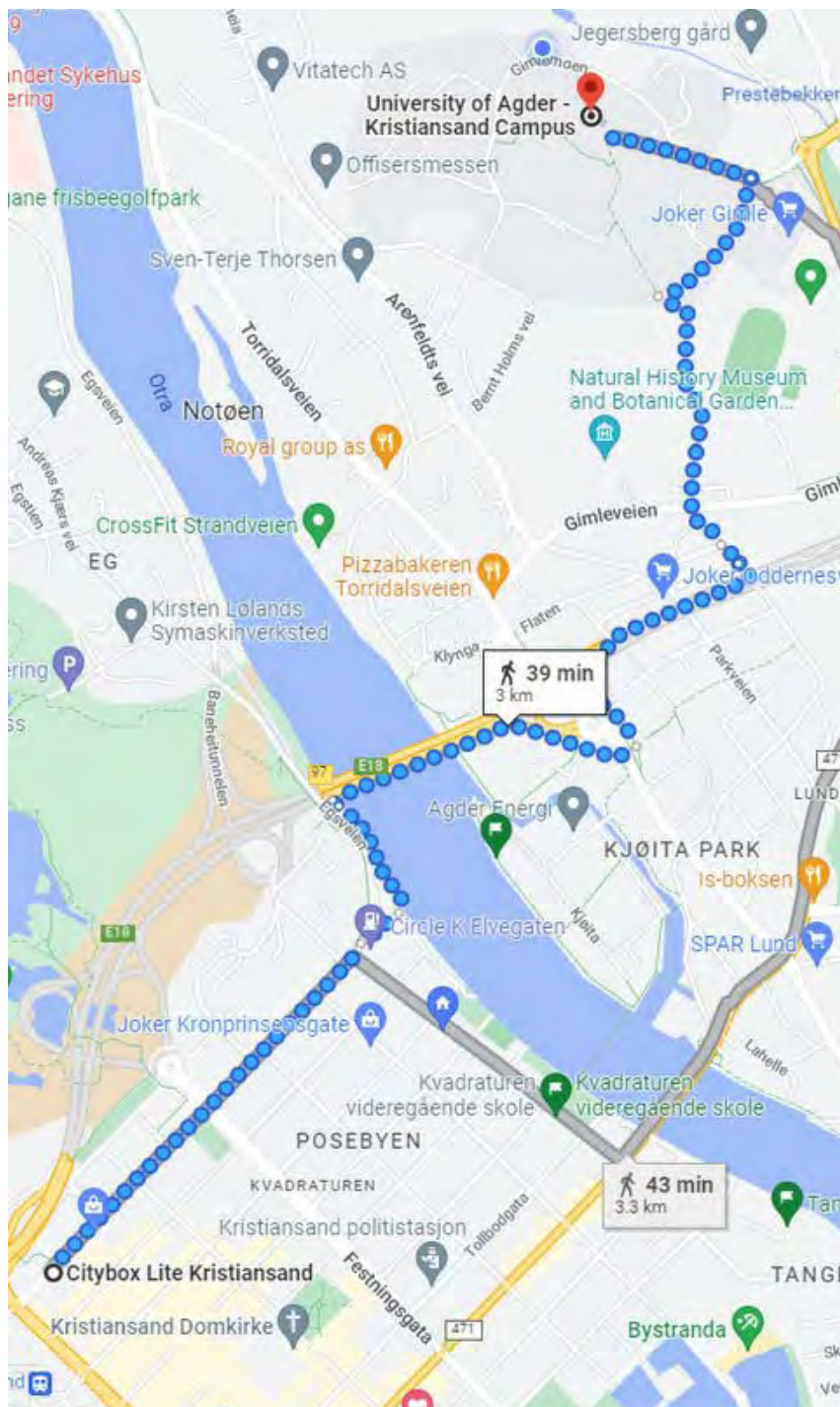

If you enjoy a longer walk with beautiful scenery in the morning or afternoon, walking from the hotel to our campus and back is one possibility. Walking the **3km** route takes about **40-50 minutes**, and there are different routes that you can take.

However, if walking is not your cup of tea, especially in the early morning hours, we collected some information on public transport for you on the following page.

Public transport

Public transport in Kristiansand only consists of buses, and the trip from the hotel to campus and back does not involve much planning, since numerous bus lines serve both stops. However, there are slower and faster connections, and this is why we have some recommendations for you:

Use the app **AKT Reise** to find suitable connections around your hotel. There are many bus stops and each bus line has its specific bus stops. This means that **not all buses hold at all bus stops!**

Now, to buy bus tickets, download a second app which is called **AKT Billett**. You can work yourself through the different ticket options, but most likely single tickets for each trip will be the cheapest option, as all other tickets only pay off if you take more than two trips a day.

Note: the moment you purchase a ticket in the app, it will be valid for 1,5 hours and then expire. **Only buy a ticket if you plan to get on a bus within the next 1,5 hours!**

Passengers are allowed to enter through the back door, and no face masks are required. However, you need to validate the QR code in the app and a green light has to come up at the validation machine on the bus.

To make an arriving bus stop for you, you need to hold out your hand (or if it is dark, you might even want to hold out your phone, so the bright screen catches the drivers attention).

The bus stop at the university is called **Universitetet**.

You can for example take lines
M1, M3, M4 or 12, 19, 35, 36

Note: Bus line **15 is called "UiA"** when you are travelling in the direction of the campus, but it takes a **long detour** and it is not recommended to take this line!

To travel from campus to city center, you can take the same bus lines as shown above, but make sure to take the bus going in the other direction at the bus stop.

The city of Kristiansand

Kristiansand is a smaller city inhabited by about 95.000 people. In summer, many people like to go for walks and hikes, even shorter hammock and camping trips in the local recreational areas that consist of hill tops, forests, and lakes. Others like to go kayaking, swimming in the sea, spend time in their cabin in the mountains or on islands, or on their boats.

Popular attractions are the zoo "Dyreparken", "Bølgane" frisbee golf park, the swimming pool and spa "Aquarama", the outdoor climbing park that offers long zip lines across a lake and climbing high up in the trees of a forest "Høyt & Lavt", the climbing gyms "Sørlandet Klatresenter" and "Klatreverket", the dock "Fiskebrygga" where you can enjoy see food and ice cream and find the fish market close by, the city beach "Bystranda", and the recreational areas Jegersberg, Baneheia and Odderøya. In the very center of the city, you can find "Markens gate", a street filled with shops, and a beautiful church on the market place "Torget".

ARKIVET - Peace and Human Rights Center

ARKIVET Peace and Human Rights Centre is an education- and documentation centre based in Kristiansand in the southern part of Norway.

ARKIVET Peace and Human Rights Centre studies how the retelling of our local history from World War II can help create attitudes, knowledge, and understanding in order to secure the basis for lasting peace and democracy.

The centre contributes with research, education and information activities, exhibitions and conferences.

Before the Second World War

ARKIVET was inaugurated as a State Archive in Kristiansand on March 8, 1935. The brick building in Vesterveien 4 is in a residential area on Bellevue just outside Kristiansand city center.

When the Germans arrived in 1940, the State Archives was an exciting house because it was a substantial building with thick brick walls and many rooms and floors. Overlooking the entrance to Kristiansand, the building had a central location.

During the war years

The Germans occupied ARKIVET on April 10, 1940, and the first two years it was the German air defense soldiers that used the building. From 1942-1945, the Gestapo took over the house and started using it as their regional headquarter. ARKIVET was during these years, known as the "house of horror".

The Gestapo (the German Secret State Police) took over the State Archive in January 1942 and turned it into a regional headquarters. Hauptsturmführer Criminal Commissioner Rudolf Kerner, the head of the German Secret State Police in Kristiansand, led the takeover. A total of around 3,000 German Sipo officials came to Norway during the war. The Gestapo was the executive branch of Sipo and has, therefore, often been used as a term for the entire security police.

ARKIVET was not a prison during the war, but a police station for the German security police. Cells and torture chambers got established, and detainees from all over the region were brought here for questioning. The stay could last from a few hours or a few days up to four weeks. Three hundred and eleven prisoners got tortured at ARKIVET. Most of them were between the age of 20-45. Sipo carried out the violence, but often with Norwegian help. There were about as many Norwegian and German citizens who earned their living at ARKIVET in the years 1942-45.

Ole Wehus, one of the most notorious and dangerous informants in southern Norway. Said during his treason case, "I am 100% sure that everyone who was employed at ARKIVET during the war, somehow had to know what was going on, because sooner or later they could not avoid seeing the prisoners after they had been treated". Norwegian employees also knew what was going on and contributed to the abuse and torture of prisoners, but only Ole Wehus was sentenced to death after the war.

Resistance Members in Captivity

More than 44,000 Norwegians were imprisoned during World War II, in camps and prisons in Norway, and various types of camps and prisons spread over large parts of the world. On a national basis, around 9,000 Norwegians were sent to concentration camps and prison cells abroad. From the Agder counties, 730 people were involved. They were to be completely isolated from the outside world and disappear without a trace in "night and fog".

Right outside the old entrance in Vesterveien 4 is a bust of Arne Laudal. Major Arne Laudal was a district leader for Milorg in the south of Norway. Milorg was the military resistance movement in Norway during world war II. He participated in the fighting in southern Norway in 1940 and organized Milorg in the region in 1941. Laudal was arrested in his home in December 1942 and send to ARKIVET. During interrogation at ARKIVET, he was subjected to horrendous torture, and in 1944 he was sentenced to death and shot in Trandumskogen.



After the war

After the war ended in 1945, the Home Force took over ARKIVET, before it once again became a State Archive.

Inside ARKIVET there was room for 3500 shelf meters with archive items. It lasted for about 30 years, before space capacity became a growing problem. The solution was to build a new one, and when the state archives moved to new premises, it was scattered around four different places in the city.

ARKIVET was a State Archive until 1997. After the State Archives moved, Sørlandet Krigsminneforening established an action committee that protested against ARKIVET being put up for sale on the open market. The action committee was established as a foundation in 1998: The Foundation Arkivet.

After extensive restoration, the center for history dissemination and peacebuilding was opened on May 8, 2001.

Nowadays

ARKIVET arranges guided tours through their various exhibitions, participates in and contributes to larger events on the local and regional level, and organises various other larger and smaller events both in-house and in external locations.

Karuss Skole - The school you will visit

Karuss is a 1st - 10th grade school located in Vågsbygd. Our school was built in 2002 and has 50 staff and 430 pupils. We are divided into children's stages (1st - 7th stages) and youth stages (8th to 10th stages). At the primary level we have one parallel, and at the junior level we have three parallels. In addition, we have an after-school program (SFO) for pupils from 1st - 4th grade.

At our school, we are convinced that collaboration, inclusion and community provide the best academic and social learning. The adults work in teams/stages which together have a common responsibility for the pupils. We have two contact teachers in each class because we want the best possible follow-up of the individual student and because we believe that collaboration on the student's development is a success factor.

Every morning, all pupils are welcomed to a 15-minute morning assembly where the pupils experience news, go through the day, get practical information that gives them a sense of predictability. We are concerned that all children should experience mastery in the class community.

It is a goal that all adults at Karuss focus on cooperation, inclusion, positive reinforcement and relationship-based classroom management. Working with collective structures provides a good basis for learning.
